So, Who Knows What is Going to Happen on the Federal Level with Long Term Care Funding?

As we were planning the 2017 Aging Network Conference months in advance, we were certain Congress would have decided by the end of August what to do about Medicaid, the Affordable Care Act and other federal long term care funding. What level of cuts would be anticipated? Would there be block grants? If yes, how would they work? (In fairness to us -- and we always want to be fair to us... I'll bet some in Congress thought the same thing. And, by now, most powerful people in Washington wish we had been right!)

So, we structured the FASP Intensive around the impacts of federal long term care funding on Florida's elders. We recruited an excellent panel: they were knowledgeable; diverse in their perspectives; respectful of their colleagues; and passionate! Panelists were: LuMarie Polivka-West representing the Pepper Center at FSU; Thair Phillips of RetireSafe in Washington, D.C.; and Anne Swerlick of the Florida Policy Center, based in Orlando, whose stated goal is 'Prosperity for all Floridians'.

In a context of health care reform, Thair outlined the status of the health care debate with particular emphasis on Medicaid, including the potential for Medicaid being block granted. RetireSafe supports block grants.

LuMarie followed with a wide-ranging presentation on the direct impacts of potential block grants and other Medicaid changes for the Florida Aging Network and their clients, in particular. She added useful comparisons between Florida's positon, due to Legislative policy and budget decisions over the years, and the positions of several other states who had taken different paths. (MLD note: Decisions have consequences, whether or not Legislators are aware of them or intending them at the time the decisions are made. We are currently living with a number of those consequences from previous years' decisions implementing tax reductions. You will hear a great deal more about this through FASP and FCOA as we deal with budgets in the 2018 Legislative Session.)

The Intensive was one month ago. Anne said that Repeal and Replace of the Affordable Care Act was dormant, but not dead. She was spot on. As I began writing this article days ago, it was once again on the Congressional agenda for a possible vote this week. Before I could finish this article, it was pulled from a vote. Is it once again dormant, or is it now dead -- at least for a while? Rather than pulling out just some of the Policy Institute's most informative yet alarming facts, I urge you to read their report for yourselves. I learned a lot of new information from reading it before the Intensive and then hearing Anne speak.

Participants rated the overall session a 3.35 out of 4 possible points (4 was excellent; 3 was good). The two areas rated highest were: speakers responsiveness to participants, 3.83 and knowledge of the speakers, 3.78. Of the 10 written evaluation comments, 4 were complaints about the temperature and seating arrangements of the room. The other comments were:

- ~ Anne Swerlick presented peer reviewed stats and research. She also provided resources we could review after the workshop. The other speakers did not.
- ~ Too much political talk.
- ~ Great program with multiple perspectives.
- ~ It is unfortunate that Larry Polivka could not attend. Anne's presentation was very balanced.
- ~ This session was not what I expected.
- ~ Very informative.

Disaster Preparedness

The Florida Department of Elder Affairs' Emergency Coordinating Officer coordinates with the Florida Division of Emergency Management on emergency preparedness issues and post-disaster response. The Department ensures that the Area Agencies on Aging and local service providers have all-hazards Disaster and Continuity of Operations Plans to be implemented during a threat of imminent disaster.

Your safety in a disaster depends heavily on your own actions, and developing a survival plan is the first and most important step.

Planned Giving...Creating a Legacy for Giving

As nonprofit organizations we all rely on philanthropic donations from individuals, corporations and foundations in our communities to assist us with continuing to provide compassionate care and resources for seniors in need. For most agencies, finding and maintaining sources of funding can be difficult and time consuming, especially where there is no full time or dedicated fundraising professional on staff. This often leads to exhausting resources that could be utilized in other areas.



Take a moment to explore the various ways donors can support your organization and help you achieve your financial and philanthropic goals without overextending your already stretched staff. There are many giving options available, one in particular that organizations who serve seniors and their families often overlook but should actively focus on is *planned giving*.



A planned gift includes a bequest designated in a will, charitable trust or annuity or property, including art and other valuables. Developing a strategy to pursue planned gifts can literally change your agency's financial landscape, providing more secure long-term footing for the journey ahead. According to PlannedGiving.com, planned giving donations are among the largest gifts a nonprofit will receive, often 200 to

300 times that of annual gifts. So, if you don't have a planned giving program, you could be losing out on a significant amount of gifts.

Donors who make planned gifts demonstrate their confidence in your organization to continue to serve the mission and make a difference in the lives of seniors. Not to mention, there are substantial financial benefits and tax savings for donors.

It is strongly recommended that your agency enlist the assistance of financial professionals

such as tax, legal and accounting advisors to guide the planning process. Also, consider including the donor's family members well. By doing so, you ensure that all parties involved are protected and that they all are in agreement with how their family member's legacy will be carried out by your agency.



Remember, every gift of any size helps but planned giving can be the perfect solution that allows for donors to have a greater financial impact and makes a meaningful difference for seniors in your area.



ACL Releases First Ever National Data on Adult Maltreatment

At the National Adult Protective Services Association conference, ACL released the first consistently, systematically and nationally collected data on the abuse of older adults and adults with disabilities.


<u>This report</u> is the first of a series based on data from the first year of the National Adult Maltreatment Reporting System (NAMRS). NAMRS is a voluntary data reporting system collecting data from state and local Adult Protective Services systems.


Fifty-four of 56 states and territories contributed data to NAMRS in its first year. This high level of voluntary participation reflects the value that leaders in the field of adult maltreatment see in this data. While NAMRS is still in its infancy, the information it will provide in the years to come will directly inform prevention and intervention practices at all levels of the adult maltreatment field. It will provide a better understanding of the characteristics of those experiencing, and perpetrating, abuse and identify system gaps for responding to maltreatment and preventing repeat maltreatment. As states and territories will continue to improve information systems, add data elements, train staff on new data collection methods, and report additional data, NAMRS data will become an extremely valuable tool.

Data collected by NAMRS includes APS staff and case-load, response and response time, intake and investigation practices, maltreatment type, victim characteristics, and perpetrator characteristics. For example, 44 states and territories reported opening investigations for over 877,000 clients.

Many in the adult maltreatment field, including the federal Elder Justice Coordinating Council, have recognized the need for national data on adult maltreatment. After the passage and funding of the Elder Justice Act, ACL awarded the first-ever federal grants to enhance Adult Protective Services. These grants were used by many states to build data systems and align them with NAMRS. View the first NAMRS report.




